Substation & Transmission Project Update



After months of intensive project organization, design work, voltage research, ownership negotiations and non-construction site preparation, Belmont's new substation project reached a significant

milestone in the second quarter of 2014, as demolition of the current building at 20 Flanders Road has begun. McConnell Enterprise, Inc. is on site and has begun dismantling the building's interior and constructing a new wall between 20 Flanders Road and its adjacent building. Demolition of the existing building is expected to be completed in August.

While the demolition is happening this summer, Belmont's project team expects to complete the Contractor's bid package for construction of the new Substation building and issue bid solicitations late this summer. Additionally, the procurement of major equipment for the project has started and will continue through the end of 2014.

Also, this past quarter, NStar filed their regulatory application with the Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities (DPU). DPU hosted a public hearing to review details of the project in Belmont on July 8th and will conduct a site visit later in the month.

Technical efforts remain on target to issue contractor bid solicitations for the construction of the new Transmission System (different than the construction of the new Substation building), as well as to achieve the necessary approval of the Independent Systems Operators – New England (ISO-NE) and to qualify for Transmission Cost Allocation funding by the end of 2014.

Belmont Light Receives Energy Efficiency Grant



Summer Energy-Savings Tips: Manage Rising Electricity Costs

Belmont Light customers may notice that electricity prices have increased in 2014. The graph above shows the wholesale electricity price in the winter of 2014 compared with the winter of 2013. Market forces in New England, including higher natural gas prices throughout the region, led to markedly higher electricity prices this year over last. As a result, many electric utilities in New England, including Belmont Light, have increased rates to cover rising supply costs. Customers can help keep their electric bills low by conserving energy and installing energy efficient lights and appliances in their homes. Here are a few more tips for conserving energy and saving money this summer:

- Turn off lights, appliances, and electronics when you're not actively
 using them. Unplug electronic devices and chargers that have a block
 shape transformer on the plug when they are not in use.
- Clean clogged air conditioner filters so they operate more efficiently.
 If possible, install room air conditioners on north-facing walls or
 on a shady side of the house. Close all windows and doors when
 operating an air conditioner and set your air conditioner thermostat
 as high as possible.
- Unplug any spare refrigerators. A second refrigerator can add 10-25% to your electric bill.
- Use a microwave to cook. Doing so will add less heat to your kitchen than using an oven.
- Reduce the operating time of swimming pool filters and automatic cleaning sweeps.

Increasing your Home's Energy Efficiency through Vapor Barrier and Ventilation

Insulation in your home provides resistance to heat flow. The more heat flow resistance your insulation provides, the lower your heating and cooling costs will be. A properly insulated home gives the added benefit of improving your personal comfort.

Effective vapor barriers and good ventilation are important factors in a well-insulated home. For instance, they can help combat excess moisture. Daily activities like cooking, cleaning, and breathing all produce excess moisture in a heated house. Too much moisture can damage your home in a variety of ways. If moisture overly saturates insulation it can drastically reduce the insulation's ability to resist heat loss, creating mold, mildew, and other decay in building materials and insulation. In addition, wet insulation, which is heavier than dry insulation, can overload your ceiling, causing sagging or more serious damage.

Effective vapor barriers ensure that too much moisture doesn't pass through the walls, ceiling, or floor of the building.

Additionally, adequate ventilation, particularly in attics and crawl spaces, will prevent moisture from condensing on the insulation or the building structure.
